Mary Lindemann is Professor of History at the University of Miami. She has been President of the German Studies Association and the President of the American Historical Association.

Lindemann has written extensively on early modern German and medical history. Her most recent books include: *Liaisons dangereuses: Sex, Law, and Diplomacy in the Age of Frederick the Great* (2006), *Medicine and Society in Early Modern Europe* (2nd ed., 2009), and *The Merchant Republics: Amsterdam, Antwerp, and Hamburg, 1648-1790* (2015). She is currently writing a book on the wars of the mid to late seventeenth century and especially their aftermath in Brandenburg.
